

Careers in Criminal Justice

Associate Degree

A variety of careers in the Criminal Justice field do not state a required degree. However, to be hired at a police department, you will need a Bachelor's degree or minimally an associates for smaller counties. Admittance into the academy can be competitive. For this reason, a candidate is more likely to gain admittance if he/she has a higher level of education.

- Corrections Officer (requires 60 credits of college work, requires academy)
- Police Officer (requires academy)

Other careers for associate degree level include:

- Intervention Specialist
- Victim Advocate
- Security Officer
- Dispatch/Telecommunications Operator

Bachelor's Degree

Here are some examples of careers that may require or prefer a bachelor's degree in a Criminal Justice related field. In addition to a degree, employers also want to see work experience in the industry.

- Juvenile Detention Specialist
- Corrections and Parole Officer (requires academy)
- Probation Officer
- Police or Detective (requires academy)
- Forensic Interviewer (advanced field experience required)
- Victim's Right Advocate
- Legal Advocate
- Re-Entry/Workforce Development Coordinator
- Social Services Specialist
