We have consistently explored a multitude of very relevant topics based on the foundation of knowing who we are in Christ. The clear biblical teachings on same sex marriage or attraction, racism, emotions, Islam, and social media have been very engaging and helpful for our students, faculty, and staff. The consistent theme of finding truth and definition from God's Word as the anchor for our beliefs is refreshing and convincing.

NO GREATER LOVE

y family loves to hike and has enjoyed hiking together for years. Have you ever gone hiking and seen the trail ahead of you become increasingly elevated, indicating a big hill in the distance? As you slowly and excitedly work your way upward, your anticipation grows as to what you will see when you arrive at the top. Climbing an upward trajectory always requires a higher level of exertion than walking on flat ground where little can challenge you. So it is with organizations—whether churches, colleges, or businesses. If an organization desires to move in an upward pattern of growth, there will be greater exertion and testing of the muscles and systems of the organization as a whole. But what is revealed from the top of the hill is most often worth the effort! The fulfillment of the anticipation upon reaching the top is exciting and new stimuli races into the mind of the hiker or organizational leader.

I have often stopped at the top of a big hill to rest, and to revel in the new view. From this view I have a perspective which I never could have imagined or have had described to me from the lower elevations. Here at the top, we snap pictures in celebration of the trail we have climbed, but even more exciting, we see the new vistas awaiting us beyond the challenge we just conquered. In many cases we never even realize there are additional challenges on the other side of the hill as we were not able to see them from below. To climb up (or drive over) a large hill must begin with a plan and vision to move forward and accept the challenge. This decision is followed by the resolve to "stick with it" and make it to the top. This initial vision and resolve is not to be passed over lightly. In a church or other Christian organization, there is often a strong sense of change and vision which the people of God sense is God's prompting to move and take action for His glory. This may be a



new ministry, or an outreach into new territory (locally or internationally), or it may be a substantial retooling and upgrading of a ministry to position it for greater effectiveness and impact. The progress of the climb takes commitment and an eye on the benefits of the future over present comfort. In God's Word and throughout history, we see many examples of His people consistently sacrificing themselves in obedience to conquer their hills and to expand the His work with His enablement.

At Grace Bible College we are coming to the top of the rise in 2016.

Five years ago in courageous faith, the Board of Directors adopted an aggressive vision for the leadership team of the College to move up a large hill. Prayerfully, and in great faith, the leadership set forth to fulfill that vision. Vision 2016 was set in motion and communicated. It stretched our faith, tested our resolve to focus on the future, aligned our resources, and sought greater involvement of God's people. It was stated as follows:

IN 2016, by God's grace and Divine enablement, Grace Bible College will be an excellent Biblical University of 1000+ diverse students impacting the world according to their God-given callings.

This vision was defined as the fulfillment of our mission statement in the future while holding strongly to our four core values (Grace Theology, Bible-Centered, Ministry Focused, and Transformational Relationships) which make us Grace Bible College. In 2011, we had 200 students in a classic traditional educational program on an aging college campus with a 'stretch capacity' of 350. This was the large hill ahead of us, and we began to chart the path to ascend it, needing the cooperation of all parts of our campus; even those who doubted it was a possibility.

In the vision, we described the best that we could how we believed God desired us to progress and grow. We embarked upon a \$1.8 million capital campaign aimed at revitalizing our aging campus. The Beyond the Bricks campaign successfully refreshed the major public areas of our campus, including a new student commons, the Jack T. Dean Academic Center, business offices, parking lots, walkways, and landscaping. Aggressive enrollment growth pushed us to fully utilize our facilities as we grew from 200 to about 340 traditional students with a goal of being at 350 in the fall of 2016. The Adult and Online Educational (AOE) program was launched in 2011 with the approval from our accrediting agencies, the writing of our own curriculum, hiring of staff, and educating faculty regarding this new mode of education for busy adults. The AOE program has over 500 students and is heading toward the goal of 600 by fall of 2016. Our work in the area of graduate studies has begun. Fifteen graduate students enrolled in January of this year, and another full cohort is anticipated in the fall. These students live all around the United States and our instructors teach online from various regions across the US as well.

The level of excellence within our academic and student services has steadily increased with the addition of competent staff members, organizational assessments, and continual improvement measures implemented campus-wide. Additional faculty members have been added who have, or are pursuing, terminal degrees. Staff members address the spiritual, emotional and academic needs of our students and are dedicated to quality human resourcing and growth as well as systems improvement in our pursuit of excellence in everything. Pastor Gary Spykerman served as the first Vern Schutz Chair of Pastoral Ministry, and Paul Sweet currently serves in that role, dedicated to training our new generation of pastors, and preparing and equipping these young men to work in our Grace Churches.

Lord willing, in the fall of this year, we will stand on the rise of this large hill we have known and pursued called **Vision 2016.** In anticipation, we can say that the view from the top will be exhilarating, yet revelatory. We already, with the rise in elevation, see ways we can minister and impact that we never saw before. Henry Kissinger once stated, "Every success is usually an admission ticket to a new set of decisions." We anticipate God's clear direction and vision as we pause to celebrate His enablement to fulfill Vision 2016. We also pray for clarity as we survey the landscape over the rise and in faith, seek a vision toward 2020 and beyond.

Praise God for how He has enlarged our ministry and impact. In April 2015, we sent forth 129 graduates equipped to impact church and society. 129 is only a few students short of what our total student body count was when I came to the College in 2003. Oh how the Lord has grown us and blessed us! He also has entrusted us with greater responsibility. We seek to be able and faithful stewards of that trust. We thank you, friends and alumni of the College and ask you to pause and celebrate with us the ascent to the top of the rise. We also ask you to prayerfully be a partner in the vista of the journey ahead of us. Together, in dependence on God, anything is possible.

Grace Bible College is committed to the Word of God, and to following the leading of the Holy Spirit. We work as unto the Lord, striving to serve with integrity. Although our mission will not change, we must continue to expand our academic programs and pursue excellence.

NEW PROGRAMS

We have received final approval from the Higher Learning Commission to offer the Master of Arts in Ministry. The MA in Ministry has courses that are biblical, practical, and relevant for ministry in the church and culture of the twenty-first century. This 36-credit, online program emphasizes academic rigor, student engagement, and the learning community. Our first cohort began in January 2016.

We are also developing several new courses, concentrations, and programs. Four new concentrations were recently approved: urban ministry, leadership, Old Testament, and New Testament. New programs were approved, including a BS in Psychology and a MBA. With these additional offerings, GBC will have a greater impact in the world for Christ.

Even though my passion to help students has been strong ever since stepping into a classroom, being at Grace rekindled my own faith in Christ as well as my passion to help others. This is due in large part to what I see around me while at GBC.

JACOB RODGERS
Bible and Theology Faculty

I came to the saving knowledge of Christ at the age of four because of the faithful service of Bill Rigg. During a low point in the marriage of my parents, Bill interceded and brought the good news of Christ's sacrifice and hope of a new life. This choice to follow God impacted the life of my parents and the trajectory of our family tree. As I grow older, I am amazed at how different the path taken by my family looks from that of our cousins. Although I came to the knowledge of Christ at a young age, I did not surrender my life to Christ until I started working at Grace Youth Camp (now known as Grace Adventures). It was under Chad Coppess and the staff of Paradise Ranch that I realized I was called to serve God, not with "lip service," but with service calling for total life investment. I wanted to be involved in a ministry that dramatically altered the trajectory of other families. I saw the amazing power of God at work in the lives of troubled teens and youth that found the hope of Christ despite their hopeless situation.

At that point, I decided to pursue theological education. I graduated from GBC in 2012 with my BS in Biblical Studies, and continued my education at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California, graduating in 2015 with my MA in Theology. When I started my journey, I fully intended to go back into camp ministry, but during the course of my education, God placed the joy of teaching and a passion for education on my heart. So many Christian children go to college as followers of Christ but become disillusioned about faith and life. I believe it is not the gospel which has failed them, but rather we (the church) have not properly prepared them to enter the lion's den! We have trained them to be innocent as doves, but the wisdom of the world is like the wiles of the serpent in the garden. The world constantly asks, "Did God really say...?"

While I attended Grace, my perspective was that the College was small and struggling to make a significant influence outside of its own community. Since then I have witnessed God developing and building the College into an increasingly diverse and influential work! Diversity in age, race, sex, and perspectives have brought new challenges to the College, but have also paved the way toward broader and more systemic change to our West Michigan community and beyond. By broadening the educational base of our undergraduate program and offering graduate level education, GBC is further opening its doors to those who may not know the good news of Christ. Some students come because they are interested in obtaining a business degree or pursuing a degree in criminal justice with little to no interest in a Biblical or theological education. However, we know that the Word of God does not return void (Isaiah 55:11). It moves and works within the lives of all it touches. We have the grand privilege of being the rock that can divert the root structure of a family tree. My story could have been one of abandonment, disillusion, sibling strife, and hopelessness had it not been for the faithfulness of one follower of Christ. We have the opportunity to impact the lives of our students, as well as the lives of those our students touch.

As a new faculty member I have been welcomed with open arms. Senior faculty members have been willing to guide me along in my professional development, and I have felt embraced as a colleague. My opinions are not only accepted, but requested. I could not have asked for a better growth environment before I go on to pursue my doctoral studies.

LINDA HOLTON Assistant Registrar

In 1984, I graduated from Grace Bible College and began my journey serving Christ. God sent me to Grace Bible Church in Port Orchard, Washington, to serve as Director of Christian Education. 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



It is often said around GBC and by GBC students and alumni that one of the biggest blessings of Grace Bible College is our community. We are a family who cares about and for each other. Friendships become lifetime relationships among many of us, and every so often, a story surfaces which illustrates the depth of this love and commitment we share. Christy Boeck Robinson (1990) shares this story of how God connected three GBC families for over forty years, and how during those years, He showed His patience, His love, and His grace.

So often in our lives we plan, meet, organize, and prepare so much that we miss seeing God's hand in action. God has the ultimate plan and His plan is carried out with ultimate patience.

In the late 1960's the Lord led my parents, Jim and Maggie Boeck (both GBC alumni), to minister at the Preakness Bible Church in Wayne, New Jersey. While living there, we (my parents, my brother Noah, and I) became friends with Bill and Carol Wilderson and their children, Wendy, Charma, Billy, and Duane. We grew close to each other during those years. In 1978, my family moved on to a new ministry in Holland, Michigan. We remained friends with the Wildersons, but lost touch with each other for a time.

In 1988, I enrolled at Grace Bible College, and met an incoming student from Clearbrook, Virginia, named John Robinson. We dated, became engaged, and were married in 1990. During that same time period, Billy Wilderson enrolled at GBC. He had already graduated from college elsewhere with a degree in engineering, but had always felt led to go into the ministry. His desire to minister had been fostered by my father during their time together. While at GBC, Billy reconnected with my family, and met my husband, John. Billy, John and I became close friends, and we led a youth group together at Berean Bible Church in Holland, Michigan.

Billy graduated from GBC with a BTh in 1994, and returned to his family farm in New Milford, Pennsylvania. Although Billy never entered into "full-time professional ministry," he always found ways to minister and share his faith. Over the years, he ministered in a variety of ways, including leading youth group canoe and camping trips, doing maintenance work for youth camps, leading Bible studies, and speaking at Sunday services for local farm and tractor shows.

During this period, our family grew. We adopted our son, Matthew, in 1997. In 1999, Marie, Anthony, and Elizabeth were adopted. In 2000, Samson was adopted. Jessica was adopted in 2002, followed by the adoption of James in 2006. In 2008, son Isaiah was born into the family.

In 2014, our son, Matthew had just completed his junior year of high school. He applied for, and was accepted to a summer leadership experience at West Point Military Academy in West Point, New York. We drove him to New York, and during the week while he was working, I was able to show John around Wayne, New Jersey. We were also able to attend a Sunday service at Preakness Bible Church and connect with old friends. On a whim, we decided to take a couple of days to drive to New Milford, Pennsylvania to see Billy. Friends from the church had mentioned that Billy was battling some illness, and we wanted to check in with him.

During that visit, we learned that Billy's illness created secondary issues which led to renal failure, and Billy was now on dialysis, and awaiting a kidney transplant. Billy talked openly about being on the



transplant list, and shared that there were ups and downs, but his faith in God's love did not waiver. He told us, "I'm in God's hands." John and I spent the night with Billy, and returned the next day to West Point to pick up Matthew. On the drive back to West Point, we talked about Billy's situation, and his strong faith in God. During the conversation, John asked me what was involved in becoming a kidney donor. Having a medical background, I knew there would be blood type and tissue match testing. He asked me how I would feel if he went through the process to become a donor. I told him if he felt like it was something he wanted to do, I would fully support him.

When we returned to Michigan, John and I contacted the Lehigh Valley Hospital transplant office (Billy's hospital) to inquire about being a donor. The hospital sent a packet of documentation and tests that needed to be completed. The very first test was the blood test to make sure the two would be a match. During the blood draw, John asked the nurse what the chances were that they would be a match. The nurse responded that it was not likely, but it wasn't impossible either. The blood tests were a match. God was showing His hand!

The next step would be to complete chest X-rays, CAT scans, more in-depth blood tests, and urine tests. Our son, Matthew was scheduled for some outpatient knee surgery. John and I took him to the hospital for his procedure. While he was in surgery, we went to the patient registration window and said, "We don't have an appointment here, but are looking to be kidney donors, and need this list of tests. Our son is in surgery right now, and we were wondering if you could do these tests while he is under." The registration nurse looked at the list, and responded that they could do all of them but one, and could do them immediately. Once again, God was showing His hand!

The last test to be administered before a final OK would be given was a 48 hour kidney function test. The results came back unfavorable. The nephrologist (kidney specialist) assigned to John said he would not allow John to be a donor because the output

contained oxcillates at a 450 level. High oxcillate levels indicate future kidney stones, and could be very dangerous. We all were very disappointed by this news. But Billy again reminded us that the process was all in God's hands. God had a purpose. Throughout the process, the Wilderson family prayed the most heartfelt and humbling prayers! Their faith and love for the Father was so real and so comforting.

A few days after the news, John contacted the nephrologist to ask what could be done to lower his oxcillate levels. The doctor told him, "I will not recommend you as a donor. Your levels are so high, that with any diet I give you, you won't be able to get the numbers into an acceptable range. Your oxcillate levels need to be under 250." After much discussion, the doctor relented, and sent John a diet to follow for six months. The oxcillate levels would then be re-tested.

The diet consisted of many basics – like increased water intake and lower sodium intake – along with many other things. The diet was followed, the six months passed, and the test was re-administered. This time, John's results came back with an oxcillate level of 200! The kidney transplant coordinator called us, and informed us that she just left the transplant team meeting (which included John's nephrologist). The team was in agreement that John could donate! She also commented on several occasions that the change in oxcillate levels was nothing short of amazing. Of course, what the transplant team was unaware of was the number of people praying! People were not praying that the levels would change, or even that the surgery would be a success. People – with Billy leading the charge – were praying that God would be the focus of this process. In light of God's power and love, low oxcillate levels really aren't that impressive!

With all the testing finally behind us, a surgery date was set. The first available date that worked for everyone was September 30, 2015, which was four months away. Time slowly passed, and arrangements were made. My mother, Maggie (Grandma) Boeck would stay with our children in Michigan, assisted by our family friends Nate and Linsay Mitchell, while we were gone. John's parents, Curtis and Hattie, as well as his sisters Nannette and Jacque, would travel to Pennsylvania to be with me, Bill, and Carol during the surgery. The September 25 pre-surgery appointment arrived. Billy and John had simultaneous doctor appointments throughout the process, even though they were under the care of separate doctors. We spent most of that next week with the Wildersons. During this time, Billy's parents, Bill and Carol, prayed with the families constantly. When there was good news, the Wildersons prayed and were thankful. When there was bad news, the Wildersons prayed and were thankful. Their faith was an incredible blessing.

At 6:00 am on September 30, Billy, John, and family members arrived at Lehigh Valley Hospital to begin the transplant process. John was taken to pre-op. A short time later, Billy joined him in pre-op. They were in connecting pre-op rooms, and were able to communicate with each other right up until the beginning of the surgery. Billy had commented several times over the past months that one side effect of his kidney failure was difficulty in completing his thoughts. He said his mind felt cloudy, and he would frequently find himself searching for words.

Shortly after noon on September 30, John's surgery was complete, and he was in recovery. The surgeries were staggered by a couple of hours, and later that afternoon, Billy's surgery was finished, and he was also sent to recovery. As Billy came out of the anesthesia, he commented that his mind already felt clearer. He felt like he could think clearly again! At this point, nobody was sure whether Billy's body would reject the kidney or not – but at this point, it felt like the surgery was a success.

Soon, John was moved from post-op to a medical surgery floor to continue recovery. Billy was moved there the next day, and was placed in the room next door to John's room. We asked the nurses how often that happens when a donor and recipient end up in rooms next to each other. They said it seldom, if ever, happened. Many even said they had never had it occur while they had worked there. For the next week, Billy and John had the same nurses, and they were able to walk together as part of their rehabilitation. Our families were able to


visit both rooms and spend time together, praying together and ministering to each other. Visitors were also able to visit both men easily. The feeling was that God had taken care of every detail!

Just as John and Billy were admitted together on September 30, they were discharged together on October 5. Prior to the surgery, they would talk, and John would encourage Billy. The "daily grind" could be difficult, and at times Billy would become discouraged or frustrated. After surgery, the tables were turned. John was struggling after the surgery, and Billy became his encourager! He encouraged John to get up, walk, and follow the rehabilitation process.

Now that months have passed, Billy and John look back on the process with amazement. They are amazed at the number of people who sacrificed to make this a reality. Our church families prayed continuously; co-workers picked up the extra work load; Grandma Boeck gave of her time and resources; our children picked up the work load at home; our parents and families traveled, prayed, and chauffeured; friends provided meals; I worked to care for John, and keep our family and friends updated; and cards upon cards arrived from many people – with encouraging words of comfort.

At the end of all this, Billy and John hope that this is not just a story about a "medical procedure," but a story that leads people back to the cross of Calvary – reminding us of the greatest sacrifice that was ever made. They desire that this become a story of God's people answering the call to care for each other in Christian love.

Graduates, we have learned to trust God. All of us worked very hard, studied long hours, and trusted God to give energy and stamina to finish. That hard work brought us to this point: it is the conditioning for the work yet to come. It is evident that we trust God, because we are here! God gave us the tenacity to persevere through the many obstacles and challenges we faced, because of our trust in Him. It will be very difficult to accomplish goals and reach our potential, if we do not trust God. Trust Him always and in all things! Trust God and pray. Ask Him to give you strength to handle difficult times. Trusting in Him gives assurance that we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us!

It is time for us to go out into the world with the spiritual gifts, tools, and the knowledge of Christ -- the Word of God! Be ready to meet the broken, hurting, and suffering souls. Be compassionate, and encourage everyone, demonstrating your trust in the Lord! I have learned to trust God by listening to His voice more and less to my own. I think back to a time when I was in business—and it was all about that business. I trusted things and relied on other people. My focus was in the wrong place and I made mistakes in my decisions. God deserves so much more than just a few moments of our time. We must totally trust God at all times, moving beyond our pride and fleshly desires. Trust is essential.

Proverbs 3:5-6 tells us: Trust in the LORD with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths. We did not come to GBC by accident! This was part of God's plan for our lives. He brought us together, to learn, to encourage one another, to work alongside each other, and to build relationships! God has been transforming us from the day we began at GBC, and that transformation is awesome! When we totally surrender to Christ, the Lord transforms us by changing our lives. Trusting God is needed for transformation. And, God continues to "chip away" at us to bring more and more change to our lives. Graduation does not end our transformation, we will continue to be transformed by our obedience, dependence, and total trust in our Lord Jesus Christ!

To be prepared to serve, we must stand on the foundation of God's Word, and know His Word is to be handled as II Timothy 2:15 states: Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed...but, it does not stop there, it must be by ... rightly dividing the Word of Truth. If this is not done, we will fail, there is no validity to our message, and that will weaken our mission! How can we be sure we are truly leading others to Christ if we do not rightly divide the Word of Truth?

In teaching others and preaching the dispensation of the grace of God, we must rightly divide the Word of Truth. Whatever position we pursue as Christians we must not deviate from God's principles nor from the dispensation of the grace of God, given to the Apostle Paul. When we are negligent in this area, we are not being true servants of the Lord! Let us preach the Word (II Timothy 4:2).

When you are given an opportunity to disciple, mentor, teach, or preach, treat it as if it is your last opportunity! Preach the cross of Christ by rightly dividing the Word of Truth. In I Corinthians 2:1-5 Paul said: And I, brethren, when I came to you, came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, declaring unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ, and Him crucified. And I was with you in weakness and in fear, and in much trembling. And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power: That your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God.

Remember our faith and trust is to be in God, not in ourselves or anyone else -- just Him! We all may look different outside, but on the inside, if the love of Christ is in us, we are the same. God knows our hearts. The world wants us to separate ourselves from one another because of ethnic, financial, or educational differences. Apply what you learned at GBC about trusting God and His Word, so you are true servants of Christ, demonstrating His love! God knows His servants. II Timothy 2:19 says: Nevertheless the foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, the Lord knoweth them that are His. And, let everyone that nameth the name of Christ depart from iniquity.

I believe our College is the greatest college in the world. Its nucleus is formed by its leadership, culture, and mission - which is driven by the Spirit of Christ--the force that makes change come about in the lives of individuals!

Lord without you we are nothing, without your guidance we are lost, without your strength we cannot make it, and without your Word we would die!

So let us live, keeping a daily appointment with the Lord. Read, pray, and meditate on His Word each day! Now and forever more, continue to stand fast in the faith! In the name of Jesus, AMEN! AMEN! AMEN!

I want to affirm what Brother Craig said. No matter how much we feel we have accomplished or how successful we feel we have been, we must continue to depend on and trust in God. I loved his emphasis on the Word of God. What a great challenge to keep His Word central in our lives, as it is foundational to any career God calls us to. I would like to reflect a bit more on what it means to be prepared to serve Christ.

What does it mean to be prepared? We have all heard things like, "Oh, you don't have a writing utensil for class... you're not prepared..." Naomi and I leave for Africa soon and people keep asking, "Are you prepared? Are you ready to go?" And this week, I had people ask, "Are you prepared for your speech?"

As I reflect on my time at GBC, there are three areas where I feel we have been prepared.

- We have been prepared intellectually. This one may be obvious, but it shouldn't be taken for granted. GBC has top-notch professors who have prepared us well, and not only in the realm of theory and academics. We have learned to ask the right questions and to think "out of the box." We have learned to study the Word of God at a high level. We have learned to think and see the world through a certain lens.
- We have been prepared relationally. We have learned how to live
 in community, how to grow our relationships, and grow close
 bonds with one another. We have learned that loving people is
 one of the most important things we can do, especially when it
 comes to being leaders wherever God places us.
- We have definitely been prepared spiritually. GBC is absolutely graduating godly individuals today! We have learned to place Christ at the center of every aspect of our lives. We have been given the tools to continually grow in our ongoing, never-ending relationship with Christ.

Being prepared suggests that there is something to be prepared for! GBC is graduating godly individuals prepared to *serve Christ*. Our being prepared does not carry as much significance if it is not done in the context of serving Christ. We have been prepared in a way to take what we have learned into our future ministries -- whether we are a pastor, businessman, social worker, or school teacher. There will be certain circumstances for which we will not feel prepared. Part of being prepared means learning

to rely and depend on the Holy Spirit. As we serve Christ, we have to let the Holy Spirit take care of business.

We must remember the Spirit of God makes us competent to serve Christ! II Corinthians 3:4-6 says: "Such is the confidence that we have through Christ toward God. Not that we are sufficient in ourselves to claim anything as coming from us, but our sufficiency is from God, who has made us sufficient to be ministers of a new covenant, not of the letter but of the Spirit." No matter how special or gifted or prepared you feel you are, it is God who makes you competent for ministry.

And, it is important to acknowledge that God makes our serving Christ successful! I Corinthians 3:5-7 says: "What, after all, is Apollos? And what is Paul? Only servants, through whom you came to believe — as the Lord has assigned to each his task. I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow. It doesn't matter how well we have been prepared -- when we are serving Christ, God is the one who makes us successful!

Even when we feel we are prepared more than we need to be, difficulties will happen. There will be times -- even seasons in life -- where obstacles seem to be never ceasing, and we will feel we are in "over our heads." But take heart! God is the one who makes us competent in our service, and God is the one who makes us successful in our service to Him.

So graduates, our diplomas are not the end all. Our preparation at GBC was NOT the finish line. I encourage you to take time to reflect on what you've learned. But, please don't stop moving forward or pushing toward the goal. You're ready... but this is not the end. Keep moving forward.

Grace Bible College, please keep doing what you're doing: graduating godly individuals prepared to serve Christ in church and society.

And, I encourage every one here to figure out what your passion is, get prepared, and let the Holy Spirit guide, direct, and empower you as you serve Him! Be willing to change your plans for God, and always be available and willing to follow His call on your life.

When the foundations are being destroyed, what can the righteous do? The Lord is in His holy temple; the Lord is on His heavenly throne. He observes the sons of men; His eyes examine them. The Lord examines the righteous, but the wicked and those who love violence His soul hates. On the wicked He will rain fiery coals and burning sulfur; a scorching wind will be their lot. For the Lord is righteous, He loves Justice; upright men will see His face (Psalm 11:3-7).

PRACTICE GENEROSITY AND INTERDEPENDENCE IN THE **CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY**

Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality. At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need. Then there will be equality, as it is written: 'he who gathered much did not have too much, and he who gathered little did not have too little' (II Corinthians 8:13-15).

According to the Lord's own word, we tell you that we who are still alive, who are left till the coming of the Lord, will certainly not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord Himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever (I Thessalonians 4:15-17). All that is here on earth which is not eternal will be left behind and of no value. Invest in the eternal - lives changed by effective ministers and ministries!

alk into any bookstore and look at the size of the self-help section. You will quickly recognize that we live in a world in which people are desperate to understand themselves. As a culture, we long to move from

where we are to where we want to be, discovering our true identity, mission, and purpose. In actuality, this outward search for selfknowledge displays an underlying, greater need: we are a people desperate for the knowledge of God.

In contrast to our culture's seemingly incessant search for selfreliance, self-understanding, and self-help, the great Reformer John Calvin notes at the outset of his Institutes of the Christian Religion, that right knowledge of the self can only be found by pursuing the knowledge of God. He says, "it is evident that man never attains to a true self-knowledge until he has previously contemplated the face of God, and come down after such contemplation to look into himself" (Institutes 1.2). In Calvin's view, the rebellion and sin of the human race against the Creator makes it impossible for us to truly understand ourselves. Such knowledge cannot start with us; it can only begin, Calvin says, with a contemplation of the face of God. The idea of contemplating the face of God originates with Paul's second letter to the Corinthians. However, before we get there, we need to see that Paul's frame of reference goes all the way back to the earliest days of nation of Israel.

More than 3,000 years ago, God revealed Himself to a shepherd named Moses, famously calling to Moses out of the burning bush. When Moses asked this God who He was, God replied: "I am the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob." God further goes on to reveal that He is a God who is on the side of His people, that He has heard their cries for deliverance out of slavery in Egypt, and has come down to fulfill the promises made to the patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. When Moses asks God's name, the Lord replies, "I AM THAT I AM." Here, the Lord reveals His covenant name, which our Bibles typically translate LORD. After a mighty deliverance of the nation of Israel from Egypt, culminating in the plague of the firstborn, the first Passover, and parting of the Red Sea, the Lord brings His people to the foot of Mt. Sinai in the wilderness. It is in this place that the Lord reveals Himself to Israel; significantly, Sinai is the very place where the Lord initially revealed Himself to Moses.

After the giving of the Ten Commandments and the rest of the Book of the Covenant (Exodus 19-24), Chapters 33 and 34 of Exodus go on to describe Moses' unique relationship with the Lord. We read, "The LORD would speak to Moses face to face, as one speaks to a friend" (Exodus 33:11). In another well-known instance, Moses says to the Lord, "Show me Your glory." To which the Lord replies, "I Myself will make all My goodness pass before you, and will proclaim the name of the LORD before you" (33:18). However, the Lord also says, "You cannot see My face, for no one can see My face and live" (33:19). Famously, the Lord hides Moses in the cleft of the rock, while His glory passes by, and what Moses sees is more like the trail of God's glory, a shadow, or an impression of the Presence of the Lord. What can we take away from this mysterious, awe-inspiring relationship between God and Moses that might reveal something about our knowledge of God (and therefore our knowledge of self)?

In the Hebrew language, the word for glory is kabod, which means "splendor" and has the sense of brightness that causes one to bow down or hide one's eyes because of the weight or majesty of what has been witnessed. Interestingly, Exodus 34 says that after his meetings with God, Moses' face would shine with God's glory (Exodus 34:29ff.). There was something about the radiance of God's nature that continued to shine through Moses, who had to put a veil over his face so that he could speak to the people (Exodus 34:33-35). The glory of the Lord shone so brightly through Moses that it was too much for the people around him; it overwhelmed and terrified them!

We now have an adequate background for understanding what Paul wants to say to some of the earliest Christians. The apostle Paul is writing to the community of Corinth, to a group of people who have put their trust in the crucified and risen Savior, Jesus the Messiah. In order to describe the glory of his new covenant ministry as an apostle of Jesus Christ, Paul uses the story of Moses to teach some incredible truths to these believers related to their identity in Christ. In fact, Paul frames his entire ministry around the idea of contemplating the face of God as it is reflected in Jesus Christ. He says:

And we all, who with unveiled faces contemplate the Lord's glory,

The word "contemplate" in this verse deserves some special attention. You may note that some Bibles translated this phrase as "reflect the Lord's glory." Perhaps you even memorized this verse with the word "reflect" instead of "contemplate." The good news is, both translations are accurate: the original Greek word is katoptrizo, which literally means "to cast a reflection" or "look at oneself in a mirror" (BAG, 4th Edition, 424). When you get right down to it, it's not that big of a jump, from merely looking at oneself in the mirror to contemplating what you see. Perhaps the best (and least embarrassing!) example of such contemplation is that of a bride on her wedding day: as she gazes into the mirror, she indeed sees her reflection, but her contemplation of that reflection reveals so much more. Her whole life has led up to this moment: all the dreams, all the hopes, all her plans. Her state of reflection - both physical and contemplative - is much deeper than a superficial reflection of her physical appearance.

So it is with the believer. The Apostle says that we "contemplate" (or reflect) the Lord's glory, and through that contemplation (reflection) we are transformed into His image, with "ever increasing glory" (II Corinthians 3:18). Thus when Christians "look in the mirror" (i.e., think about our identity) we do not see our own image reflected, but rather the image of Jesus Christ, who is himself the image of God (II Corinthians. 4:4). The contemplation of this good news, both in the person and work of Jesus Christ on our behalf, results in the transformation of the believer as we come to reflect the glory of God more and more in our everyday work, family life, and the pursuit of our God-given talents and vocations. This transformation itself comes from the Lord Jesus Christ, and is the ongoing work of the Spirit to produce Christ likeness in us (Galatians 5:22ff.).

Therefore unlike Moses, who had to put a veil over his face to cover the glory of God, believers in this dispensation of God's grace ought to shine the glory of God freely, extravagantly, magnificently. Paul says it like this, "For God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' made His light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ" (II Corinthians 4:6). The same God who said, "Let there be light!" and created all things by His powerful Word, causes the light of redemption to shine through the lives of believers today. It also bears mentioning that just a few verses later, Paul goes on to describe the reflection of this glory as an imitation of Jesus Christ in His suffering, describing Christian life as weak, imperfect, and frail. Like "treasure in jars of clay," this reality constantly reminds us that the power and glory reflected in Christian life comes from God and not from ourselves.

Truly, this is where we find our identity. Not in the knowledge of self, but in the "knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ."

At Grace Bible College, our theme for the year is "Know Your Identity." And as a believer discovers his or her true identity, mission, and purpose in Jesus Christ, contemplating Him and reflecting Him to the world, they begin to put the glory of God on display for all to see. This means finding God's strength in weaknesses, frailty, and failings (II Corinthians 12:9-10). It means finding God's purpose in the seemingly random (good or bad) events of life, and in the mundane of everyday work, child rearing, and home life. It means finding our identity and meaning in Jesus Christ, not just in joyful times and the 'highs' of life, but even in the midst of suffering, tragedy, and incomprehensible loss. This kind of rightly-ordered self-knowledge has the potential to make every aspect of life in Christ overflow "to the praise of His glorious grace, which He has freely given us in the One He loves" (Ephesians 1:6). May you come to know that your identity - your true identity - is in the crucified and risen Lord of the world, Jesus Christ, and that your mission, purpose, and all meaning in life ultimately comes from Him.

Former Athlete: Allen Durham, Men's Basketball 2007-2011

Allen Durham finished his college basket-ball career at Grace Bible College in 2011, after winning three consecutive NCCAA National Championships. He had quite the career as a Tiger -- earning All-American Honors three times, National Tournament MVP three times, as well as receiving the NC-CAA "Pete Maravich Player of the Year Award" in 2011. He currently holds the all-time records at Grace in scoring (2,467), rebounding (1,314), blocked shots (151), and field goals made (1,037).

In 2012, Allen began his professional basketball career in Romania, and has since played professionally in Finland, Israel, the Philippines, and France. Currently, Allen has chosen to stay in the States to play on the Dallas Mavericks' NBDL (National Basketball Development League) team: The Texas Legends. The NBDL is widely regarded as the top league in the world besides the NBA. In addition to playing in Texas this year, Allen is now owner of Grand Rapids' newest professional sports team, The Grand Rapids Danger, members of the ABA (American Basketball Association). His goal is to use the platform of professional basketball to grow and nurture the community of Grand Rapids

with volunteer work and donation drives, while putting an entertaining product on the basketball court for the community to enjoy. Another part of this endeavor will create an avenue for local basketball talent to continue their basketball careers after college. A current player on the team is 2015 GBC graduate Cameron Cramer.

Allen is still very involved in GBC Athletics. Throughout his time as a player and afterwards, he contributed time at speaking engagements and basketball camps. Before Allen left for his season in Texas, he worked with the current Grace Tigers team.

"Grace Bible College took me in when a lot of schools wouldn't give me a chance, and I'm very grateful for that, so I'm happy to help whenever time permits," Allen says.

"Allen has had a much-publicized career, and much more could be said about his on the court greatness. My biggest compliment to Allen is that during his playing time at Grace and after, he never refused to help me, Grace, or the team in any capacity. He has been totally unselfish with his time to promote GBC.
